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Registration - enforcement

- 31 enforceable provisions under REACH registration
- 2010 Article 117(1) reports highlight little actions no sanctions
- 2015 reports no information public
- No evidence that market access has been restricted for non compliant substances
- No real consequence for non compliance



Registration - obligations

• No data, no market

• The information to be submitted for registration shall contain the technical dossier and the CSR

 Requirement to provide relevant and available physicochemical, toxicological and ecotoxicological information



Compliance shortcomings

- It is necessary to instil confidence in the general quality of registrations [recital 65]
- Non-compliance can result in damage to human health and the environment. [recital 122]
- ECHA found 781 non compliant dossiers over 1130 evaluations performed in 2010-2013
- German screening found low levels of compliance for main endpoints.



Role of enforcement

- Member States shall maintain a system of official controls and other activities as appropriate to the circumstances.
- "[n]ational enforcement authorities have a crucial role in ensuring compliance with the data requirements. Hence they play an important role in the implementation of the strategy."



Role of enforcement

- Enforcement can apply to the information requirements of REACH
- Desk based inspections should be prioritised for their cost-effectiveness

• Penalties must be applied



ECHA – Enforcement interactions

- Clarify scope of evaluation vis-à-vis enforcement;
- Seek for implementing ECHA decisions before deadline

• Provide for immediate consequences when SONCs are issued (no market access).



Conclusion

- Enforcement has a crucial role in making REACH work
- Registration provisions are enforceable

• ECHA's and Enforcement role need to be clarified

 Market access must be impaired to protect human health and the environment.





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
