Minutes of the

34th meeting of the Forum for Exchange of Information on Enforcement Helsinki, Finland 4-7 November 2019

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I. Summary record of the proceedings

Item 1 – Welcome and introduction

1.1 Opening by the Chair of the Forum

The Chair welcomed all the participants. She announced apologies from Liechtenstein, Croatia, Malta, Hungary and United Kingdom. Croatia has given proxy to Slovenia, Hungary and UK gave a proxy to Germany. Slovenia has given proxy to Austria for the first day of the meeting.

The Chair informed that the quorum requirement was met.

1.2 Adoption of the agenda

The Chair indicated the changes in the agenda (Content V, $\underline{\text{Annex 1}}$). The agenda was adopted.

1.3 Declarations of conflicts of interest with regard to agenda items

The Chair requested all participants to declare any potential conflicts of interest for any of the agenda items, according to Article 9(2) of the Rules of Procedure. No conflicts of interest were declared in the meeting.

1.4 State of play with action points from Forum-33

The ECHA Forum Secretariat informed the plenary on the status of the action points from Forum-33 and highlighted the open actions.

1.5 Report of the written procedures and other issues between Forum-33 and Forum-34

The Chair referred to the document with the results of the written procedures between Forum-33 and Forum-34.

Item 2- Forum's activities related to POPs

The ECHA Forum Secretariat reminded that the recast of the POPs Regulation¹ entered into force in July 2019 and Article 8(2) mandated the Forum with the task to "coordinate a network of the Member States' authorities responsible for enforcement of this Regulation." In 2018, during the preparation of the Forum's work programme 2019-2023, the Forum already identified high-level actions related to POPs Regulation.

To address the expansion of its remit to the POPs Regulation, the Forum formally agreed on the type of actions it would take with relation to POPs as well as the corresponding triggers for their initiation:

Regarding the reporting obligation by the Member States on the enforcement activities mentioned in Article 13(1)(a) of POPs, the Forum agreed to expand the mandate of the WG Member States reporting to work on the template for that obligation.

Item 3- Forum's enforcement activities

3.1 Prioritisation of REF projects

3.1.1 WG progress report

The WG chair briefed the Forum on the activities of the WG and on the results of the new prioritisation exercise, considering the new project proposals sent by Forum members after Forum-33. The registry of legal obligations covered in past Forum's projects was updated and would be published.

The ECHA Forum Secretariat informed on the latest updates concerning the CTAC (Chromium Trioxide Authorisation Consortium) upstream application.

There was indication that five out of six uses covered in the CTAC will be authorised in time for the project. In addition, two more big upstream authorisations were granted for a number of chromates (not for Chromium trioxide, which was covered by CTAC): CCST (Chromium VI Compounds for Surface Treatment) and GCCA (Global Chromates Consortium for Aerospace)². ECHA believed that by 2021 there will be enough (~2000) companies with granted authorisation decisions for chromates to run an impactful project.

Forum members would receive a document with more information on the work plans for the authorisation decisions by the REACH Committee in the near future. COM was expecting the CTAC authorisation to be agreed in Nov 2019 and published in the Official Journal by Feb 2020.

The discussion on enforcing conditions of authorisation (including how to deal with changed conditions) was planned to be held by the COM with the establishment of a task force at CARACAL. It was recommended for Forum and WG REF-9 representatives to participate in the task force to help achieve an agreement before the operational phase of REF-9.

Therefore, ECHA Secretariat considered that the concerns raised in Forum-33 by the Forum should be addressed before the operational phase of REF-9 and supported REF-9 to focus on Authorisation.

The WG Third pilot on authorisation collected information at the end of September 2019 and noted that there were 218 authorisations decisions that could be checked, still guaranteeing a meaningful project without the CTAC decision.

The Forum voted and agreed that REF-9 would focus on Authorisation. The Chair added that in case the decisions would not take place as planned by the COM, the Forum could consider a two-phased operational phase for this project.

The mandate of REF-9 was established in agenda point <u>8.1</u>.

3.1.2 Mandate amendment

The Forum adopted the revised mandate of the WG (<u>Annex 2a</u>). The current WG chair extended his mandate until the end of 2020.

3.2 Member States reporting

3.2.1 WG progress report

The WG provided a second round of comments to the COM's contractor Milieu on the version of the REACH/CLP template consulted with the Forum.

Work on the BPR and PIC reporting template was ongoing. On the PIC report, it was not foreseen a revision of the template; however, the WG would make a proposal to COM to assess the need of revising the PIC template.

On the work originated from the REACH evaluation joint action plan (action 12), the Forum agreed to pilot an annual reporting to ECHA. A draft of that annual reporting template for REACH/CLP was prepared and being consulted with the WG.

As discussed in <u>agenda point 2</u>, the POPs regulation foresees a Member State report on enforcement activities related to POPs under Article 31(1)(a), hence the WG initiated the draft of such template. In parallel, ECHA and Competent Authorities were working on the other information requirements for this Member State report (defined in Article 13(1)(b)-(f)). As COM intends to publish an implementing act defining the minimum information requirements for reporting under Article 13 in 2020, the Forum should define and agree the content as soon as possible so that its preferences can be included in that implementing act.

3.2.1 Mandate amendment

A new task concerning the POPs Regulation was added to the mandate and the Forum adopted the revised mandate of the WG (<u>Annex 2b</u>).

3.3 Interlinks

3.3.1 WG progress report

The WG continued to update the Interlinks guide, revising the different appendices and updating the process for the enforcement of dossier evaluation decisions to be consulted with Forum. The chapter on dossier evaluation was nearly ready for Forum consultation.

To address Action 12 of the ECHA/COM REACH Evaluation Joint action plan, the WG drafted a questionnaire to NEAs on the measures for breaches of compliance with dossier evaluation decision. The questionnaire was being discussed with the WG and would be consulted with the Forum before being launched.

3.3.2 Mandate amendment

The Forum adopted the revised mandate of the WG (<u>Annex 2c</u>).

3.4 Enforceability of restrictions

3.4.1 WG progress report

The WG finalised the Forum advices on the restriction proposals of micro plastics, D4D5D6 and Formaldehyde and was preparing the final draft versions of the advices on the enforceability of the restriction proposals skin sensitisers, PFHxS and calcium cyanamide. Moreover, the WG provided support to RAC and SEAC on the discussion of three proposals.

As the Forum's advice is provided early on in the process and the text normally changes during the lengthy process, it was proposed for the WG to review the process for providing advice on enforceability of restrictions in 2020. ECHA Forum Secretariat added that there will be in 2020 an evaluation of the impact of the Forum's advice on the new restrictions. That could trigger recommendations in

2021 for changes in the process. In the meantime, it will be explored improvement areas in the interaction between the WG and RAC/SEAC.

It was noted that the rapporteur of the Forum WG was only invited for the dialogue concerning the part on enforcement and missed previous discussions that could be important to understand the background of some statements and changes. Hence, it was welcomed additional information from RAC/SEAC to help the rapporteur/WG to give the proper advice.

The WG concluded that the number of dossiers to be tackled in 2020 were much less than in 2019, which would allow time for the WG to revise the compendium of analytical methods and elaborate the "registry of concerns on restrictions". The WG chair informed that it was collected three analytical methods from Stakeholders in the last years. The Forum agreed that it was needed more visibility on the exercise of updating the compendium of analytical methods in order to have more input from Stakeholders. In parallel, such request could also be sent to the custom's laboratories, via DG TAXUD.

The COM representative informed that COM was in the verge of finalising the restriction proposal on Diisocyanates and although it took into account the Forum's advice, it was modified. The Forum was requested to revise a specific paragraph on enforceability of that restriction to feature in the final text of the restriction proposal. The Forum rapporteur and the Forum agreed to have a quick consultation round in time to be submitted for the next REACH Committee meeting.

3.4.2 Mandate amendment

The Forum adopted the revised mandate of the WG (<u>Annex 2d</u>).

3.5 Third pilot project on authorisation

3.5.1 WG progress report

After the Forum-33, the WG updated the draft manual with the substances that could be investigated under the project. In light of the discussions held in 3.1 and the decision on the scope of REF-9 to be on Authorisation, all the work developed by this WG will be used as input in the new project REF-9.

3.5.2 Mandate amendment

The Forum agreed to close this WG (<u>Annex 2e</u>), as the tasks will be taken over by the new WG REF-9. Most of the experts from the pilot project will take part in the REF-9 WG.

3.6 REACH-EN-FORCE-7 on Registration

3.6.1 WG progress report

The project's operational phase was ongoing by Dec 2019 and, in the meantime, the WG was on-hold to support any query from the national coordinators. The Forum Secretariat would launch an assessment questionnaire to the inspectors participating in the project before the end of the operational phase.

The WG chair encouraged the timely submission of the results of the inspections by the end of the reporting phase (end Mar 2020).

3.6.2 Mandate amendment

The Forum adopted the updated mandate (<u>Annex 2f</u>).

3.7 Cooperation with Customs 2

3.7.1 WG progress report

The operational phase of the project was ongoing by 30 Nov 2019, where 17 countries participated. The Forum Secretariat would launch an assessment questionnaire to the inspectors participating in the project before the end of the operational phase.

3.7.2 Mandate amendment

The timeline was corrected to align with the timeline in the manual. The Forum adopted the updated mandate ($\frac{\text{Annex } 2g}{2}$).

3.8 Implementation of Interact portal for NEAs

3.8.1 WG progress report

The WG tested the two new versions of Interact Portal during June-August 2019, prior to its release. Moreover, the WG was testing the collaboration module of the Interact Portal, which will enable simultaneous work on a document online for Forum/BPRS Members and the Forum/BPRS WG members. The release of the functionality was planned for November 2019.

Another functionality of the Interact portal will be the meeting module, which will be made available only to the Forum and BPRS Members in the preparation of the future plenary meetings. The WG was involved in the testing of this module as well. The WG chair shared his thoughts on the tool and found that all the needed information was there but the Forum's working style might need to be reviewed. He highlighted a possibility to use the safe messaging system in the tool to communicate within the WG/Forum. The WG did not have any general recommendations on the use of the new features, and it would leave it to the individual WGs to define the best way to work.

Replying to a Forum member, the documents in collaboration module will have a traceable version history, which will be accessible and possible to download.

3.8.2 Update on ECHA IT tools for inspectors

ECHA Forum Secretariat informed on the updates that came with the new releases of the Interact tool as well as the upcoming changes. The tool was designed to be used by all ECHA bodies as a main tool for collaboration. She showed the display of the new features of the upcoming modules "collaboration" and "meetings". The current tokens would continue to be in use for the new modules.

A training will be organised by ECHA Secretariat to all users on 3 Dec 2019 on the new functionalities. The recordings of the training will be available for any new users.

Change requests are collected, to be considered for implementation in new releases of the tool.

3.8.3 Mandate amendment

The Forum adopted the updated mandate (<u>Annex 2h</u>).

Item 4- Preparation for the open session

The Forum discussed and agreed on the common approach concerning the topics for discussion in the open session.

Item 5 – Conclusions and action points

The Forum adopted the conclusion and action points from the day.

Item 6 – Debriefing of the open session

The <u>Open session</u> took place on the second day of Forum-34. The Forum appreciated the high number of stakeholders and the various issues brought forward.

Some Forum members referred to the high number of presentations during the day. It was also noted that the number of ASOs participating in the open sessions have been increasing in the last years.

The ECHA Forum Secretariat would review the organisation of the open session and propose changes that could be put in place for 2020, taking into account the feedback collected from the WG Improvement of SDS.

Item 7 - Forum's enforcement activities- Projects under finalisation

7.1 Training for enforcement trainers 2019

7.1.1 WG final report

The WG prepared and delivered the training on 2-3 Oct 2019 on the topic of online sales. The WG chair presented the summary of the training, which 100% of the participants rated as "good" or "excellent".

The WG also drew some recommendations for future trainings. One of those suggested for the training event to be organised in the latter part of the year whenever the subject of the training is the same as the REF project. That would allow time to finalise the project manual and better align the presentations with the manual.

The Forum adopted the WG's report.

7.1.2 Mandate closure

The Forum adopted the updated mandate and closed the WG (<u>Annex 2i</u>).

7.2 Survey on OSH-REACH enforcement interactions

7.2.1 WG final report

The Forum took note of the preliminary results of the survey, where the 31 Member States submitted information about the differences in the responsibilities on the enforcement of REACH and Occupational Safety & Health (OSH). It was identified the specific areas of REACH and OSH where there was shared and divided responsibilities. Additional information was collected on best practices as well as the challenges faced.

The final report was being finalised by the WG and will be consulted with the Forum, SLIC CHEMEX WG and COM.

Replying to some participants, the ECHA Forum Secretariat clarified that after this exercise, the Forum could consider the recommendations from this report whenever a training and/or project are planned. The report would also allow the Forum to support and respond to Action 12(2) recommended in the REACH Review 2017.

The COM representatives appreciated the work of the WG and found this report valuable also for COM's future work.

7.2.2 Mandate closure

The Forum adopted the updated mandate and closed the WG (<u>Annex 2j</u>), in the condition that report of the WG is adopted before Forum-35.

7.3 Pilot project Substances in Articles

7.3.1 Final project report

The Forum took note of the main results of the project (presented at the Open session OS 5.2), which concluded that information gaps existed in the supply chains.

The WG chair presented the recommendation to the Forum, ECHA, COM and National HelpDesks, which were included in the report. It was planned a publication of a press release and an article in ECHA's newsletter on the results of the project.

The Forum adopted the project report, considering the latest comments received and collected in a room document presented at the meeting.

The Forum Chair recommended as best practice to inform the Forum and COM in advance of the publication of the materials of the Forum's projects. ECHA Secretariat would prepare for Forum-35 an agenda item to address all the information and publication products suitable for the Forum's reports.

7.3.2 Mandate closure

The Forum adopted the updated mandate and closed the WG (<u>Annex 2k</u>), in the condition that the all the WG's deliverables are adopted before Forum-35.

Item 8 - Forum's enforcement activities- Projects under preparation

8.1 REACH-EN-FORCE 9 – Mandate set-up

The Forum created and adopted the mandate of the new REF-9 WG (<u>Annex 2I</u>). The majority of the members of the previous third pilot project on authorisation joined the REF-9 WG.

8.2 Training for enforcement trainers 2020 – Mandate set-up

The Forum Chair informed on the proposals for training submitted by the Forum members. The Forum voted and agreed that the topic of the training event 2020 would be on Authorisation, incorporating some relevant OSH elements. The training would be prepared in close collaboration with the REF-9 WG.

Following the recommendations of the WG Training for enforcement trainers 2019, the event will take place later in the year, in Nov 2020.

The Forum adopted the mandate of the new WG (<u>Annex 2m</u>).

8.3 Pilot project on recovered substances – Mandate set-up

In the absence of a chair, the group will be managed by the ECHA Forum Secretariat as a Task Force³. The Forum adopted the mandate of the new Task Force (Annex 2n).

The experts will further define the scope of the project, to be presented at Forum-35. At that meeting, a timeline for the project will also be proposed for adoption by the Forum.

Item 9 – Practical issues for enforcement of REACH and CLP

The ECHA Forum Secretariat updated on the running issues that were not discussed at the meeting.

Issue 21.2 - Who is responsible for the elaboration of a Safety Data Sheet when an only representative is appointed?

Taking into consideration the latest input from COM from May 2019 on the issue, it triggered a complete revision of the previous draft conclusion. The participants shared their initial views and agreed to have a written consultation of the issue.

Issue 33.1 - Issue on REACH restriction entry 47

The draft conclusion was presented and the changes were highlighted, taking into consideration the input from the Forum after Forum-33. The submitter of the issue and a Forum member proposed changes that were implement in the meeting document. With that, the Forum adopted the conclusion for this issue.

Issue 34.1 – How are the provisions of child-resistant fastenings (CRF) under CLP being enforced by Member States for 'disposable electronic cigarettes' classified and labelled as 'toxic if swallowed' when they also require to be 'child and tamper proof' under the Tobacco Products Directive (TPD)

This practical issue also alerted to the fact that different regulations might be under the umbrella of different authorities and the responsibility of enforcement needed to be clear. A Forum member noted that any conclusion from the Forum needed to be relayed to the TPD actors, aiming for them to arrive at a similar conclusion.

The ECHA Forum Secretariat compiled the relevant legal obligations and propose to have a written consultation round to finalise the draft conclusion.

The input of COM's services dealing with the TPD was welcomed as well as further feedback whether compliance with the CRF requirements under the CLP would constitute compliance with the childproofing requirements under the TPD.

Issue 34.2- Issues with REACH restriction entry 27(1b)

The submitter presented the issue related to Nickel and in particular with the contact with the skin. The Forum discussed the feedback from the Forum members for the various articles containing Nickel, such as metal needles, music instruments and mouthpieces of electronic cigarettes.

Item 10 – Enforcement of ghost ORs revocation after incompliance and bankruptcy

The ECHA Secretariat reminded the Forum on the situations where ECHA could revoke its previous positive registration decision. Additionally, ECHA was proposing the possibility to revoke non-compliant registrations and from non-existing companies, in which "ghost" ORs are included.

The Forum members shared their initial impressions on the conditions and implications of such process, if it was to be implemented. The Forum members were invited to submit their comments in written form. ECHA Forum Secretariat would compile and assess the next steps, to be discussed with the Forum in a future meeting.

Item 11 – Potential enforcement of REACH Article 11

The ECHA Secretariat presented the issue based on the "one substance, one registration" (OSOR) principle, in which companies needed to cooperate and register via a joint submission. Before the 2018 registration deadline, ECHA performed the lead role verification and helped resolve disputes between the members of the joint submission and the lead registrant. For the future, ECHA proposed for NEAs to take over the case and enforce articles 11(1) and 19(1) duties of REACH in case the lead registrant needed to step back and would not do it voluntarily.

The Forum members shared their national practices in enforcing such obligations and discussed the practical aspects of such enforcement. The Forum members were invited to comment on ECHA's proposal.

Item 12 – Enforcement projects in Member States

12.1 The Italian initiative to support the control of hazardous substances in tattoo inks

It was presented the work done in Italy in order to prepare for the enforcement of the new tattoo ink restriction. The main focus of the work was to develop and validate analytical methods to detect the restricted substances of the inks used in tattoos. She called the attention of the COM for future allocation of resources for such kind of work, as it was valuable for NEAs and the enforcement of restrictions.

A Forum member informed on a national project running on tattoo inks based on their national consumer's safety act. It involved the checks of some tattoo inks and its report will be available shortly.

Another Forum member noted that analytical methods usually are not recommended in the restriction proposal dossier, leaving the work to be done by the NEAs. Hence, he welcomed further reflection by the policy-makers for the improvement on the restriction process.

12.2 Outcome of the Norwegian court case on dichloromethane paint strippers

The presenter gave information on the background of the case and the ruling of the court. The company had appealed the court decision and the NEAs were waiting the appeal decision.

Replying to some participants, the presenter clarified that inspectors were witnesses of the court case and other experts were invited to provide information on the findings from the point of view of the health of the workers and environment. **Item 13 – Conclusions and action points**

The Forum adopted the conclusion and action points from the day.

Item 14 – Update on relevant developments by the Commission

14.1 General updates by the European Commission

The COM representative gave some general updates from other fora and highlighted that the Implementing regulation on the end of phase-in substances was published, which would affect the tonnage band calculations.

The review of REACH Annexes VI-XI was ongoing and the Forum was invited to provide comments concerning the OR on the draft Annex VI on the information requirements for the REACH registration. Replying to a Forum member, the presenter clarified that the revision of Annex II was advanced but it could be

explored whether more elements concerning the OR could be included in the information requirements for the SDS.

The request from the WG REF-6 on the access levels for NEAs to the database of the Poison centres was discussed at CARACAL on 6 Nov 2019. Not much feedback was received, hence the Forum members were encouraged to liaise with the MSCA to ensure that the NEA's request was passed to the COM.

A meeting document was submitted as the response to the Forum and WG Custom 2 members' comments on the proposed changes in TARIC system related to Annex XIV and XVII. Such comments would be useful in a new study to be launched by the COM. Moreover, integration of the TARIC codes of restricted substances was not yet completed and more updates will follow.

The presenter gave further updates regarding the work of PARCS and DG TAXUD, where Forum representatives have been appointed in the last Forum meeting and would be following that work.

He informed on the plan of CARACAL to create a Task Force on application for authorisation to discuss, at expert level, changes in use covered by a REACH authorisation. Representatives from other committees would also participate. The Forum nominated three members of the WG REF-9 to take part of such task force, who will follow the discussion and communicate it to the WG REF-9.

He announced the exchange of inspectors programme was open. The scope was extended for REACH/CLP inspectors wishing to experience also other areas such as OSH and customs.

Item 15 – Market Surveillance and Compliance Regulation

15.1 Introduction of the European Product Compliance Network

A representative from DG GROW presented the new features of the new Market Surveillance Regulation, including the set-up of the European product compliance network (EPCN), to start in Jan 2021. It was aiming as serving as a platform for structured coordination and cooperation between enforcement authorities of the Member States and the Commission, and to streamline the practices of market surveillance within the Union, thereby making market surveillance more effective.

He presented the areas the new network was planning to develop, which included joint actions (budget to be allocated to those), capacity building, cooperation with customs, develop indicators and benchmarks and improve data and information exchange (by the use of ICSMS). The presenter noted that the Forum was already experienced in such areas.

The Forum was invited to participate in the network, once established. Although the Forum was not an ADCO, the regulation permitted the Forum to participate in the network in the same way as ADCOs, being represented by the Forum Chair. The possibility of a Forum delegate to represent the Forum Chair would need to be discussed.

It was foreseen the network to organise two meetings per year, and the need to continue with the ADCO meetings would be assessed.

The presenter clarified that PIC was partially covered in the scope of the Market Surveillance regulation as it fell in the general scope of the controls of customs. Replying to a Forum member, the presenter added that the new Market surveillance regulation was more focused on strategies and it was not clear about a reporting obligation from the Member States. However, the COM representative confirmed that the reports done under REACH would be used to provide information on market surveillance. A Forum member noted that the definition of product was not given in the regulation and that could be confusing. COM representative recommended to assess it case-by-case.

The BPRS Chair welcomed for this presentation to be shared with the BPRS members as it would be relevant for them too.

15.2 Cooperation between the Network and the Forum

The Forum Chair noted there were many subjects the network would tackle that were common to the work of the Forum, such as customs, ICSMS, exchange of inspectors, etc. It was important for the Forum to follow the network closely.

The Forum agreed that the Chair will represent the Forum in the European Product Compliance Network (EPCN) as of 2021. Some Forum members (AT, HU) expressed interest in following the work of the network as well, who could then act as backup of the Forum Chair in future representation of the Forum in the EPCN meetings (possibility for the Chair to be represented by a proxy will be confirmed by COM).

Item 16 - Updates from the ECHA Secretariat

16.1 Update on the ruling by the ECJ on the authorisation case T-837/16 on lead chromates

The ECHA Forum Secretariat updated on the follow up of the case T-837/16 (Sweden *versus* COM), where the European Court of Justice (ECJ) annulled the COM decision granting authorisation for the uses of lead chromates yellow and red. The presenter recalled that the General Court had found that the substance could not be used after the annulment of the authorisation decision. The effect of the judgment in case T-837/16 is that the company can stay on the market without being subject to the conditions set out in the original authorisation decision.

The Commission has submitted an application for suspension of the judgment of the General Court case (T-837/16) and a parallel interim measures case, seeking suspension of the effects of the first instance judgment.

COM's interim measures aimed at ensuring that the lead chromates can only be placed on the market and used within the scope and according to the conditions and monitoring arrangements foreseen in the annulled authorisation decision.

16.2 Follow-up of ECHA Decisions: updates from ECHA

The Forum took note of the meeting document that included a summary table of the cases sent to the Member States Focal points.

Item 17 - Updates from the ECHA Forum Secretariat

17.1 Updated Rules of procedure

The ECHA Forum Secretariat informed that the Rules of procedure of the Forum/BPRS were adopted by the Management Board on 27 Sept 2019 and were available in the Forum's website.

17.2 Nominations for Forum Chairs: Election in Forum-35

The ECHA Forum Secretariat invited Forum members to nominate the candidates for the Forum Chair and Vice-Chairs. The mandates of the current Chairs will expire in March 2020 and a new election will take place in the beginning of the Forum-35

plenary meeting. The nominated members that confirm their willingness to become a candidate will be invited to join the pre-meeting of Forum-35.

The current Chairs would finalise their first mandate and it will be possible to renominate them for a second (and last) mandate in the same position.

Item 18 – Cooperation with other networks

18.1 Updates from SLIC-CHEMEX

The Chair referred to the document submitted by the network with an update of the WG CHEMEX's activities. In the absence of the WG chair (related to BREXIT political process), COM's services were temporarily ensuring the continuity of the work of the WG CHEMEX.

Item 19 – Debriefing of the meeting with ECHA Directors – REACH/CLP/PIC/POP issues

As there were no specific REACH/CLP/PIC/POP-only issue discussed with the Directors, the Chair addressed the content of this agenda item in agenda point \underline{JS} $\underline{4}$, in the joint session.

Item 20 – Debriefing of the Forum Chair's presentation at the Management Board meeting – REACH/CLP/PIC/POP issues

The Forum Chair informed about the Forum's yearly report to ECHA Management Board, via a presentation at their meeting in Sept 2019. In general, the meeting participants reacted positively and the presentation generated much feedback. The Forum's enforcement priorities and the proposed way of dealing with future challenges was overall supported.

The issues for further attention and actions highlighted by the meeting were:

- i) on the import controls and cooperation with customs authorities (*e.g.* training customs);
- ii) integrated enforcement, more cooperation with OSH, waste and other authorities, which will bring efficiencies without increase in resources;
- iii) Online sales was seen as a major problem and further efforts in this area were encouraged, which was in line with the Forum's work (REF-8 project);
- iv)Forum's advice on enforceability of restrictions should be made more consistent and the Forum planned to review the process;
- v) More transparency and better communication to the society on the Forum and enforcement actions.

The Forum Chair suggested that in the future the presentation should be shared with the Forum members before the Management Board meeting.

Item 21 – AOB

There was no AOB raised for this meeting.

Item 22 – Conclusions and action points

The Forum adopted the conclusion and action points from the day.

Joint session of Forum and BPRS

Item JS 1 – Welcome

The Forum Chair welcomed the Forum and BPRS members and its experts to the first joint session.

The participants adopted the agenda of the joint session and did not raise any new issue.

The BPRS Chair formally opened the BPRS-9 meeting and announce that the quorum requirement was met.

Item JS 2 – Updates on the cooperation between Forum and BPR Subgroup

The Chair of the Forum briefed the BPRS members on the agreements and discussions that took place during Forum-34.

The BPRS Chair summarised the topics which will be discussed during the plenary meeting BPRS-9⁴. The Forum Chair noted with interest the results of the "fact-finding" missions organised by COM in relation to the enforcement of BPR.

Item JS 3 – Debriefing of the Forum Chair's presentation at the at the Management Board meeting

The Forum Chair informed the participants about the Forum's yearly report to ECHA Management Board, via a presentation at their meeting in September 2019 (agenda point $\frac{20}{20}$).

The Forum Chair relayed the message agreed at the Forum session that future presentations for Management Board would be shared with Forum/BPRS members prior to the meeting. Replying to a Forum member, the Forum Chair informed that reporting the Forum's activities to ECHA Management Board was to ensure that the Forum, as an ECHA body, was aiming for the same goals as the ones in ECHA's work programme/priorities.

Item JS 4– Debriefing of the meeting with ECHA Directors

The Forum Chair informed about the outcome of the regular meeting with the ECHA Directors. The main topic discussed was on transparency of the Forum/BRPS, which was perceived by some Stakeholders as not being a very transparent ECHA body. The Directors appreciated the efforts done in the last years and welcomed the effort to continue improving this area.

The Forum will hold a discussion in one of the future plenary meetings to assess how it would be possible to increase the transparency and improve the communication of the Forum/BPRS work.

Item JS 5– Joint enforcement projects

JS 5.1 REACH-EN-FORCE-6 on CLP

JS 5.1.1 WG final report

The WG chair summarised the project results of the enforcement project on classification and labelling of mixtures (presented at the Open session OS 5.2), and highlighted the recommendations to COM, ECHA and Forum. Moreover, the WG would prepare the "Tips and Hints" in Q1 of 2020.

Replying to a question from a participant, the WG chair clarified that it was not possible to conclude from the project any relation between the classification done by the company using an IT tool and other means.

It was possible that the screening made by ECHA of potential non-compliances on harmonised classification could be used in future projects. The WG could discuss and recommend a particular way the Forum/BPRS could take on that information.

JS 5.1.2 Mandate closure

The Forum and BPRS adopted the updated mandate and closed the WG, in the condition that the all the WG's deliverables are adopted before Forum-35/BPRS-10 (<u>Annex 2o</u>).

JS 5.2 REACH-EN-FORCE-8 on online sales

JS 5.2.1 WG progress report

The WG chair informed that the project manual was adopted by the Forum and BPRS. 29 National Coordinators were appointed and trained on 3 October 2019 at ECHA. The event was held back-to-back with the Forum/BPRS Training for Trainers 2019 on online sale.

The Forum and BPRS members were requested to indicate the translations needs concerning the manual. The operational phase will start on January 2020 and will run throughout the year.

The WG Chair shared that the work of this large WG was very efficient, by dividing the tasks between four sub-groups. Additionally, the WG created only one questionnaire per product, which will facilitate the analysis of the results for the report.

JS 5.2.2 Mandate amendment

The Forum and BPRS adopted the updated mandate (<u>Annex 2p</u>).

JS 5.3 Member States reporting

JS 5.3.1 WG progress report

The WG chair informed the plenary about the progress report submitted to the Forum and BPRS members. The comments received on the draft reporting template concerning the BPR section were circulated to the COM for consideration. A proposal for an annual reporting under the BPR will be discussed after the plenary meeting in November. A follow-up discussion on the matter will take place at the next Forum/BPRS plenary meetings.

JS 5.3.2 Mandate amendment

The Forum and BPRS adopted the updated mandate (<u>Annex 2b</u>).

Item JS 6 – Demonstration of the Interact portal collaboration module

The ECHA Forum Secretariat demonstrated the new tool and its functionalities. The recently released platform will allow concurrent work on same documents by group members (WGs, Forum or BPRS members). A 'Meeting' module will be incorporated in the Interact portal. In addition, a secure-message system will be available in the tool.

The ECHA Secretariat would provide training *via* a WebEx training on 3 December 2019 to the Forum, BPRS and WG members.

Item JS 7 – AOB

No other items were proposed for this agenda point.

Item JS 8 – Conclusions and action points

The Forum and BPRS adopted the conclusion and <u>action points</u> from the joint session.

Item JS 9 – Closing of the Forum meeting

The Forum and BPRS Chairs thanked the participants, the COM and the ECHA Forum Secretariat for their contributions and support. With that, the Forum-34 was closed, while the BPRS-9 continued the meeting the day after.

2019 Forum Open session (5 Nov 2019)⁵

Item OS 1- Welcome and Introduction to the open session

The Chair welcomed the 11 representatives of 11 ECHA Accredited Stakeholders (ASOs) participating in the meeting. She welcomed the 12 observers representing six countries benefiting from the Instrument for Pre-Accession Assistance (IPA) programme.

The Chair invited the IPA participants to proactively liaise with the Forum members during the breaks and discuss the possibility of joining some of their activities or to learn about the organisation of enforcement in the Member State.

Item OS 2 – Opening address by ECHA's Director of Prioritisation and Integration

The ECHA's Director of prioritisation and integration welcomed the participants and highlighted some topics to be discussed during the day as well as on the closed session of the Forum-34 meeting.

He referred to REACH Review Action 3 on the improvement of the system for extended SDS, which aimed at designing a working system for the generation and communication of relevant information on exposure control in the entire supply chain. This was closely linked to Forum's joint activity with ASOs on improving the quality of information in SDS, where the Forum and ASOs identified frequent issues with information in the SDS and recommended how it could be improved. He encouraged all ASOs to contribute to the implementation of these recommendations as well as the "building block" system that has been designed under REACH Review Action 3. In particular, the Downstream Users stakeholder organisations are encouraged to develop or further elaborate their sector use maps. Stakeholder organisations representing registrants needed to promote strongly the use of these maps amongst their members so that they will generate relevant and realistic exposure scenarios to be attached to their SDSs.

The Forum agreed on the topic of REF-9 to be on authorisation, which was most welcomed by ECHA and considered as one of the priorities and one of the strongest measures foreseen in REACH to protect the workers and the general public from substances of very high concern. In addition, there was a peak in the applications for authorisation entering into force after the decisions in the REACH Committee.

Further integration of enforcement of different complementing legislations was necessary to make best use of available resources. In that context, collaboration with customs and authorities responsible for Occupational Safety & Health (OSH) legislations is of particular relevance.

He highlighted that the REACH Evaluation Joint Action Plan was established with the Commission to intensify the dossier evaluation activities and address compliance issues in Registration dossiers. In such plan, there were actions related to enforcement (action 12), where ECHA planned to collect information through a survey on measures applicable and used when enforcing breaches with dossier evaluation. The results will be used to discuss how ECHA can support or complement the actions taken by the enforcement authorities to ensure that noncompliant registrants are brought to compliance – particularly in cases of attempted misuse of the evaluation process. One potential way of complementing the action of NEAs would be revocation of registrations which persist to be non-compliant.

Finally, he reminded that effective enforcement is critical to the success of REACH; it is also very important that enforcement is seen and perceived to be effective. The Forum and the NEAs, at national level, do a lot of enforcement work, but this is not always sufficiently visible and communicated, creating a false impression that only limited enforcement activities take place. Therefore, he encouraged the Forum to look continually for ways to improve the transparency of its actions and outcomes. The Forum open sessions are an expression of this and are one of the main tools for ensuring a continued dialogue between the enforcement authorities and ECHA stakeholders.

The Chair welcome the ECHA feedback and she linked the topics mentioned with elements of the Forum's work.

Item OS 3 - Joint initiative ECHA Forum – ECHA ASOs on Improvement of the quality of SDSs

OS 3.1 Final report of the WG on Joint initiative on Improvement of the quality of SDS

The WG chair summarised the WG's activities since the last open session and the outcome of the workshops held on 4 Jul and 10 Oct 2019 in ECHA.

The WG analysed the SDSs and identified the main deficiencies found in the different sections of the SDSs. The WG recommended some actions to be put in place to help overcome the problem, such as developing better guidance, support the development of IT tools, publish "good SDS" and raise awareness amongst Industry.

The last workshop resulted in a series of action points to be implemented by ASOs, NEAs, Exchange Network on Exposure Scenarios (ENES) coordination group⁶, Forum and a particular stakeholder, who was involved in the development of the European phrase catalogue (EuPhraC). A presentation on the catalogue was made in <u>OS 3.2</u>.

The WG would follow-up some of the actions proposed and finalise the reports of the workshops. The Forum adopted the final report of the WG.

The ASOs attending the meeting agreed with the proposed actions and to continue with the work to improve the quality of SDS. The Forum Chair invited the ASOs to provide an update on these actions in the future.

OS 3.2 European Automobile Manufacturers Association (ACEA) -Guidelines used in automotive sector for SDS and EuPhraC catalogue

One of the recommendations of the WG was to develop guidance. It was proposed to use and further develop the existing EuPhraC catalogue. The catalogue and its process was presented by a representative from the ACEA, who was also the chair of the expert workgroup developing the standard phrases and other helpful tools and information for safety data sheet authoring. She showed the content of the available and free online tool⁷.

The presenter informed the Forum on the organisation's guidance about the topic of SDS compliance check, which the users found very useful.

The Forum members were invited to individually comment on the specificity of the EuPhraC phrases and contribute to its development. It was recommended to start with sections 7 and 8 of the SDS. Such comments of the Forum members were not to be considered as the Forum endorsing the guidance.

The presenter invited the interested Forum members to attend a EuPhraC working group meeting in 2020.

OS 3.3 Mandate amendment and closing of the WG

The Forum adopted the revised mandate of the WG and conditionally closed the mandate, after the finalisation of the follow-up actions (<u>Annex 2q</u>).

Item OS 4 – Discussion topics proposed by ASOs

OS 4.1 AeroSpace and Defence Industries Association of Europe - Support for companies facing REACH-induced Supply Chain Disruption

The presenter highlighted the complex supply chain, and the difficulties in the communication between upstream chemical companies and the ultimate product manufacturers. Consequently, it was often found that upstream commercial decisions not to register or authorise chemicals (or specific uses of those chemicals) that are critical to downstream industry, resulted in trade disruption. He presented some examples where the scope of the authorisation affected the downstream users.

The organisation welcomed the NEAs to acknowledge that recovering from issues concerning authorisation was a long process for companies and that they aim to return to compliance as soon as possible. The companies were recommended to actively contact the NEAs and discuss their situation.

The Forum Chair acknowledged that NEAS were aware of the lengthy authorisation process and welcomed the early contact by the companies. In general, NEAs would not grant any particular time to duty holders who are non-compliant. Inspectors usually look at each particular case and assess it, considering the REACH objective and equal treatment of affected duty holders.

It was recommended for companies, when they are aware their substances are subject to authorisation, to actively look for substitution. The companies should aim at having contact with their supplier and the authorisation applicant (if possible), to discuss and be informed in due time of any upcoming changes in the authorisation. ECHA, COM and Forum were discussing the practical implications on enforcement when there are changes in the conditions after the authorisation is granted.

Replying to a participant, the presenter clarified that the organisation helps their members by preparing guidance, facilitate communication between the member's companies and offering training.

OS 4.2 Downstream Users of Chemicals Coordination Group (DUCC) -Industry Guidance at a Glance: Raising awareness of CLP obligations in the supply chain

The Chair referred to the room document with draft leaflets on child resistant fastenings, tactile warning of danger and online sale of chemical mixtures prepared by the organisation.

The presenter referenced the main results of the Forum's pilot projects on online sale and child-resistant fastenings and noted that the available information, including ECHA guidance, was not benefiting the actors that needed to be aware of their obligations. Following the recommendation from the Forum's pilot project, and in collaboration with A.I.S.E., DUCC have developed high-level leaflets with the aim to pass clear messages to actors across all sectors. The leaflets would be published in the DUCC webpages in Dec 2019 and would be translated to all EU languages. The organisation was contacting other partners to join the initiative and spread the message even further.

The Forum Chair appreciated the organisation's initiative to consider the Forum project's recommendations in their leaflets. The Forum, as a body, would not endorse industry-made guidance but the Forum members were invited to comment individually on the leaflets and future versions. Additionally, inspectors, in their individual capacity, in case they find them correct and appropriate, might inform companies about the existence of such documents and refer to the organisation's website.

The Forum Chair reminded that the Forum selected online sales as the subject of the REF-8 project, which will have the inspections running in 2020. So far, there was no plan to start another project focusing on child resistant fastenings but some aspects of it could be covered in the future project on classification of mixtures.

Some Forum members shared observations from the inspectors on some of the obligations covered in the project of child resistant fastenings and welcomed the possibility to provide input to the organisation's leaflets.

OS 4.3 EURATEX - Level playing field for consumer safety in textile products

The presenter brought to the attention of the Forum the importance of fair enforcement for REACH regulation in textiles. He provided an overview of the upcoming REACH restrictions that would affect the textile industry. From some national project reports, the organisation noted a low level of compliance checks made regarding textile products, which was not what was expected from a consumer article with such high number of items circulating in the EU market.

He raised the concern that the resources in the Member States would need to be used more efficiently in order to cope with the increase of restrictions/tests and continue to ensure a level playing field. In his view, there was a lack of knowledge about the real level of compliance of the textiles, as a few pilots and RAPEX did not provided a realistic representation of the market. The need and cost of the testing methods will continue to be a challenge for this industry. Moreover, the "goods package" and "circular economy" will bring further challenges in the near future. The Forum members were invited in participate in the Euratex's meeting in Zurich in March.

Some Forum members and experts explained the background for the results found in some of the projects mentioned in the presentation. It was noted that the enforcement actions were targeted, hence the results would always deviate from the real picture of the market.

A Forum alternate informed that the Forum continuously makes effort in its projects to involve customs and import controls as a regular part of REACH controls, with the view to ensure the level playing field. The resources in the Member States was an issue NEAs have been facing for years, which could be mitigated by having more integrated enforcement activities, *i.e.* checks of multiple legislations per inspection, including customs. The Forum welcomed the continuation of exchange of experiences with the organisation to better target non-compliant goods/duty holders.

She named the Forum and BPRS projects where textiles were checked. Although a new project on articles was not selected in this year's prioritisation, it could be

considered as a future project proposal, which the ASOs were invited to submit by 24 April 2020.

The organisation could further help the Forum by sending proposals for analytical methods useful for checking restrictions in textiles. The Forum will consider it when updating its compendium of analytical methods used for control of Annex XVII.

On a more practical way, the industry were encouraged to contact the NEAs whenever there is information about a potential non-compliant product/duty holder. The Open sessions of the Forum were also a good platform for exchange of information between industry, ECHA and COM.

OS 4.4 European Environmental Bureau (EEB) & BUND - No data, no market?

The presenter highlighted REACH Article 5 and the duty of the enforcement authorities to apply effective, proportionate and dissuasive penalties in cases of non-compliance with the article. Recent studies showed that the number of noncompliant dossiers were higher than desirable and it was not visible extra or stronger enforcement activities to address that situation. The presenter suggested increasing the transparency on the enforcement measures, non-compliant companies and substances in the market, which could be used to create pressure in the companies to drive them to compliance.

The Forum Chair addressed the different concerns raised by the organisation. Regarding the dossier compliance, the NEAs do prioritise those cases and enforce ECHA's decisions in which the registrants failed to comply with information requirements. However, the national priorities needed to be taken into consideration as well. She highlighted that NEAs in all Member States follow the same process (Interlinks) to enforce these decisions and they have the same criteria to decide what is non-compliant. However, harmonisation of measures between countries was not possible due national legislations but that also might not be needed nor desired, as long as NEAs were being effective with their own legal tools to bring companies to compliance.

With the new addressee policy as of 2019, ECHA sends the dossier evaluation decisions to all non-compliant registrants in the joint submission, which will lead to an equal treatment addressing all registrants of the substance. Enforcement of such decision was likely to start in 2020. The process of addressing such decisions was being revised to ensure more efficient enforcement.

It was observed high effectiveness in case of enforcement of dossier evaluation decisions, where in 91% of such cases, the information requirements were fulfilled by the company. The remaining 9% referred to situations where the company went bankrupt or ceased to exist or ECHA withdrawn the case.

The Forum will discuss in a future meeting the point about the need for more transparency of the results of NEA enforcement of dossier evaluation decisions and what would be the best information to be made available to the public.

ECHA Secretariat added a reference to the REACH Evaluation Joint Action Plan, with a number of actions to actively address the shortcomings highlighted in the REACH Review and other published studies stressing the lack of compliance of the information in the registration dossiers. ECHA and COM were committed to complete all the actions, which implied the screening of all registered substances and identification of the ones that may need risk management measures. NEAs were also referenced in the action plan and would be invited to follow-up on the decisions from the compliance check of 20% of the dossiers of substances of concern. The COM representative reminded that enforcement indicators, calculated from the Member States report to the COM, were publicly available.

OS 4.5 FuelsEurope - Maintaining REACH registrations up-to-date: The petroleum industry's approach

The presenter introduced the efforts and actions taken by the organisation on the registration dossiers of petroleum substances and their yearly updates. Moving to an evaluation phase, the organisation was focused on addressing the challenges of dealing with dossiers of complex UVCB substances, as deviations from the standard information requirements were commonly found for petroleum substances. For that, the organisation welcomed to continue the dialogue with authorities, COM and ECHA with the view to develop some methodologies and address all the concerns of all the parties involved.

The Forum Chair appreciated the efforts to promote continuous and regular updating of the dossiers among the registrants and was a good example of proactive industry approach. She noted that updates were needed whenever the requirements for update were triggered, hence potentially it would need more frequent updates than annually. This approach was also aligned with the objectives of the upcoming Implementing Regulation on dossier updates.

The Forum recommended for companies to document/record the actions taken on the dossier update or analyses made. That would help companies to proof to the inspectors on whether the duty to update was fulfilled. Data on the compliance with the update duties would be available at the end of 2020, in the context of the REF-7 project, on registration obligations.

Replying to a Forum member, the presenter clarified that discussion with the companies that regenerate waste oils was initiated to try to define the concept of UVCB and how can it be used in the context of waste (recovered substances) and exemptions from REACH. So far, those companies were able to prove their substances were the ones registered by the organisation.

OS 4.6 Cefic - Cefic's REACH Dossier Improvement Action Plan

The presenter summarised the milestones of the organisation and some of the challenges faced by Industry, from the complexity of the REACH itself to the fine balance between generating new data and use animal testing as a last resort as well as matching the expectations of authorities. Political pressure, REACH Review, REACH Evaluation joint action and results of national projects and studies were the trigger that led the organisation to create and launch an Action Plan to help the registrants to improve. This Action Plan calls for a proactive assessment of the content of the dossier, providing a framework for REACH registrants to evaluate the safety data in a stepwise manner. The Action Plan outlines the timeline, roles and responsibilities, substance prioritisation criteria, critical issues, and explains how progress will be reported. The Action Plan will take time to be implemented and will be done in cooperation with ECHA.

The Forum Chair welcomed the initiative to support registrants to review and update the data in the registration dossiers. Forum was currently working on reviewing and improving its process for enforcing evaluation decisions which was triggered by the new addressee policy of ECHA's dossier evaluation decision. Registrants should inform ECHA if there were any issues with the laboratory capacity, which would be communicated to the NEA. Upon inspection, the NEA would then consider it, case-by-case, when enforcing the dossier evaluation decision, for example when setting up the target date for submitting the requested test.

A Forum member shared that the national authorities, ECHA and the national association of chemical industry had organised two workshops for companies (with registrations 1-100 ton/year) in relation to the dossier quality. There was a good response and about 70 companies participated.

The presented shared cases of non-compliances found in the import of hydrofluorcabon (HFC) gases, used in refrigerating devices and the online availability of gama-Butyrolactone (GBL) as a cleaner product for consumer use. For both cases, the organisation have been active in putting in place some measures (e.g. information campaign, contact authorities, etc.) and welcomed further cooperation with NEAs.

The Forum Chair noted the Forum would continue working towards more and better cooperation with customs authorities to help address illegal imports. A Forum member informed that in 2016, a company had already signalled the potential illegal import of HFC gases and was investigated. However, the information was not enough to develop the case further then but welcomed more and updated information to re-open the investigation. In addition, it was reminded that CLEEN had run a project that looked at such gases.

On the availability of GBL online, the Forum was running the REF-8 project on online sales, which focused on REACH Restrictions, SDS provisions, CLP provisions on advertising and labelling and BPR duties for product authorisation and advertising. The inspectors participating in the project (in 2020) were trained in an harmonised methodology to control online sales. The results of the project will be assessed in 2021, when the Forum would look at potential improvement areas and propose recommendations.

OS 4.7 Eurometaux - Self-classifications: Of no value without enforcement

The presenter set the scene of this issue, based on Articles 15 of CLP and 31(9) of REACH, requiring legal entities supplying chemicals to the EU market to derive the applicable classification for the chemical following CLP rules and SDS obligations considering all available evidence. Many companies are supplying chemicals with classifications based on all available evidence and they are confronted on the market with competitors supplying the same chemicals without any classification. The presenter gave the examples of antimony trisulphide and borates, known for being hazardous but can be available as "non classified". Such "versions" are sold at a lower price, causing unfair competition and, above all, that situation poses a risk to the environment and human health as the chemicals supplied without classification are not packaged/labelled appropriately or accompanied by the required SDS.

The organisation invited the Forum to consider a project to enforce the abovementioned CLP and REACH articles and for enforcement authorities to check these obligations as part of the regular CLP/REACH inspections. For that, the organisation was invited to submit a topic proposal on the issue to be considered by the Forum in next prioritisation of projects' exercise.

Moreover, companies would benefit from a communication system to notify authorities about potential cases of non-compliance with classification, packaging and labelling obligations, in order to facilitate targeted inspections. The NEAs advise companies to directly contact the authorities⁸ and provide detailed information on the case as much as possible and provide the evidence that made them suspect

that there is a breach of duties. Information should always be provided to the enforcement authority of the country where the suspected duty holder is located.

The Forum had focused so far on controlling the correctness of classification of mixtures and the correct application of the harmonised classification (CLH). The checks of classification and labelling of mixtures may have also be included while checking the correctness of classification of substances, though it was not a self-standing topic directly targeted by the Forum. At national level, the inspectors prioritise the control of CLH because they control hazards of highest concern and achieve biggest impact for health and environment.

Some Forum members informed they do take action in enforcing the classification of substances and substances in mixtures. The presented suggested to involve the OSH inspectors to put more pressure to the company.

OS 4.8 PlasticsEurope – Enforceability of Restrictions in the absence of analytical methods

The presenter highlighted the importance to the companies to have validated, robust and commercially available test methods to be able to comply with the REACH restrictions. He informed that the organisation have submitted test methods for Perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) and related substances, for different matrices, to be considered for the revision of the Forum's Compendium of analytical methods.

The organisation requested the Forum to publish its position on the current status of the method development for Entry 68 as well as to publish the Forum advice on enforceability through public consultation process.

The chair of the WG on the enforceability of restrictions thanked for the submission of the test methods and it would be taken into consideration when revising the compendium during 2020, according to the methodology published in the Forum's website. It is not in the Forum's remit to comment on the status of development of methods outside of the process for advice on enforceability. As a general note, the enforcement will be possible even if the available methods are not standardised by the European Committee for Standardization (CEN).

She clarified the role of the Forum in the regulatory process, which is to advise COM, RAC and SEAC and the dossier submitter on the enforceability of the proposed entries. This was part of an established process that is available to ASOs following the work of these committees. The Forum discussed in the past the possibility to publish its advice. However, the Forum decided against since using the public consultation comments would only come from individual members and would not be a coordinated Forum's position. A Forum member suggested for the organisation to comment during the process, which was done by the company but COM indicated the company to approach the Forum.

COM representative added that restrictions tend not to include specific analytical methods since technology evolve faster than the regulation is updated. COM takes in consideration information on any challenges related to the analytical methods provided by the Forum (and other bodies) and requests CEN to develop a procedure. As the budget for it is limited, it is necessary to prioritise such requests to CEN.

OS 4.9 Humane Society International – New approach methodologies (NAMs) for Improved Chemical & Product Safety Assessment – An Education & Training Opportunity

The presenter highlighted the NAMs, which included *in silico* approaches, *in chemico* and *in vitro* assays, and a variety of new testing tools, with the aim to improve understanding of toxic effects of chemicals in the context of hazard assessment.

The current regulatory acceptance of NAMs for the safety assessment of chemicals is yet limited, in part due to a lack of familiarity in the regulatory community with NAMs and how to use the information in decision-making. Therefore, the organisation was coordinating a training program on the use of information generated from NAMs. The presenter informed about the general content of the training and its dissemination. The Forum members and inspectors were invited to take part of the training.

The Forum noted with interest the use NAMs for assessing chemical hazards without the use of animals. The most frequent situation where NEAs deal with control of fulfilment of information requirements under REACH for registration dossiers is through the enforcement of dossier evaluation decisions issued by ECHA. However, NEAs generally rely on the assessment of the ECHA Secretariat or the MSCAs as to whether the information requirements have been fulfilled and – in particular – whether the adaptations rely on new approach methods are justified and acceptable. Hence, the most relevant partners among the authorities that could get involved in the training project and comment on the training materials would be the ECHA Secretariat or the MSCAs. Forum members may pass this information to their CA partners.

OS 4.10 PETA International Science consortium – Ensuring enforcement of Articles 13(1) and 25(1) of REACH

The presenter outlined the concerns of the organisation with the enforcement of animal testing only as last resort. She referred to the presentation at the Forum open session in 2017 and the commitment of the Forum to continue investigating the last resort requirement. The organisation followed the 89 cases and still saw some cases where no enforcement took place. She welcomed an update on the enforcement activities of the cases concerning animal testing since 2017 and encouraged for an increase of the speed and efficiency of the investigations. Increase communication, transparency and report of the cases, were also referred by the presenter. Member States were invited to prioritise the enforcement of Articles 13(1) and 25(1) of REACH in their enforcement planning.

The Forum Chair replied to the questions posed by the organisation on the different issues.

The enforcement in the Member States of the last-resort requirements (and Title III in general) is done reactively to the cases provide by ECHA of suspected breach of Article 13(1) and 25(1) or Articles 10(a)(ix) or 22(1)(h) of REACH. At present, the results of the investigated cases indicated that registrants have not breached the provisions of REACH or Directive 2010/63/EU when conducting the tests. The Forum may review the approach/process once the investigation of all the 89 cases sent by ECHA is finished.

The harmonisation of penalties between Member States is not possible because penalties are defined in national laws, as is foreseen in the REACH Regulation. Harmonisation of penalty legislation for REACH would need to be done at the EU level, which was out of the scope of the Forum. It also raised the question whether such harmonisation is desirable, as the enforcement measures are to bring the company to compliance through different means, as long as it is effective. So far, there was no practical cases the NEAs could assess the different level of penalties since it was not yet identified a clear case on non-compliance with the mentioned REACH duties.

ECHA has provided the Forum with two batches cases of suspected breach Articles 10(a)(ix) or 22(1)(h) of REACH (i.e. tests done with no testing proposals) and 89 cases of suspected breach of article 13(1). Preparation of further batches of such cases will depend on the results of the investigation of those cases.

The Forum Chair gave an update the 89 cases sent by ECHA of suspected noncompliance with this duty in early 2018. 46 of them were concluded, 31 remained under investigation, there was no action taken in 5 cases and 7 were pending a response. The cases concerned duty holders in 12 countries and addressed *in vivo* studies for skin and/or eye irritation conducted after 2009. The countries that took action were AT, DE, FR, IE, IT, NL, SE, UK.

In late 2018, ECHA sent a new batch of 119 cases where registrant conducted a higher-tier vertebrate test without having sought a prior regulatory decision from ECHA approving their testing strategy. For these 119 studies found, breach of Article 10(a)(ix) or 22(1)(h) may exist of REACH. The cases were aggregated into "REACH duty holder and data owner are inside the EU", "Data owner outside the EU but has relationship to lead registrant" and "Data owner outside the EU and no apparent relation with the lead registrant". The latter cases were not investigated. By the time of the meeting, 6 of them were concluded and 77 remained under investigation. In 14 cases, no action was taken and 22 were pending a response. The countries that reported actions taken were AT, BR, DE, IE, IT, NL, SE, UK. In some Member States, the inspectors do more an investigative work, checking the substance classification and the information in the registration dossier, and did not identify any major issue so far.

At least in 32 of the investigated cases, the REACH enforcement authorities have liaised with authorities responsible for enforcing Directive 2010/63/EU.

There was only one case where the breach has expired beyond the possiblity of enforcement was due to the fact that the study in question was conducted in 2010 and the case was relayed to the NEA in 2018. The challenges of investigating such cases were related to fact that enforcement can often be enacted on legal entities that actually conduct the tests. In many cases, these laboratories that conducted the test are located oustide the EU, making enforcement impossible. Often, action on companies who commission the study is only possible under national law, but like with laboratories, in some cases, also the commissioners of the study are entities located outside the EU.

The information ECHA provides with the case are found sufficient, indicating the duty holders involved, laboratories involved and highlighting what is the suspected breach. ECHA has provided all information relevant for the case that was available from the registration dossiers.

There was much information on enforcement activities already made available publically. At Forum level, reports of every project were availabel in Forum's website. National activites were reported to COM, who then publishes the data collected from Member States fulfulling the obligation stated in Article 117 of REACH. As regards specifically to the information on enforcement of duties to use animal testing as a last resort, the Forum takes note on the need to be transparent about its actions to generate trust that investigations are undertaken. In one of future Forum meetings in 2020, the Forum may discuss the scope and form of information about these cases that could become public.

Replying to a question of the presenter, the DE Forum member informed that it might be possible that national law could be revised as a consequence of the COM's reasoned opinion to Germany regarding shortcomings in their enactment of EU rules on the protection of animals used for scientific purposes (Directive 2010/63/EU). This was a national issue that would not be addressed by the Forum.

Item OS 5 – Updates from the Forum OS 5.1 Update on the scope of REF projects

The chair of the Forum WG 'Prioritisation of REF projects' presented the results of the prioritisation exercise of 2019, where the new project REF-9 was selected and focuses on authorisation. The prioritisation exercise also recommended undertaking a pilot project on the bridging principles for classification provisions applicable to cleaning/detergent products. The Forum would decide on the timeline for the project in the next Forum meeting.

The stakeholders were invited to submit new or re-submit old project proposals for assessment in the 2020 prioritisation cycle, for which the deadline for submissions is 24 April 2020. If not taken individually, the proposal could be complemented by others to define the scope of the next REF project.

OS 5.2 Forum's finalised projects during 20199

The WG chairs summarised the results of the two projects finalised during 2019, namely the project REF-6 and the pilot projects on substances in articles.

The project **REF-6** investigated and enforced a variety of legal provisions in CLP, the most relevant stipulated in Articles 4, 37, 17, 29 and 35 of CLP, Article 31 of REACH and Articles 17 and 69 of BPR, with a special focus on classification and labelling of mixtures. The inspections were done during 2018 and the report was being finalised (publication expected in ECHA's website in December 2019).

The WG chair presented the main results of the project, where 29 countries participated, 1620 companies and 3391 mixtures were investigated. In general, it was found 17% of the mixtures were non-compliance with the classification obligation, while 33% had incorrect labelling. Overall, 44% of the mixtures were found non-compliant corresponding to 45% of non-compliant companies.

The WG chair presented the WG's recommendations to Industry, which consisted in putting more effort in deriving the right classification of the mixtures and in improving the quality of the SDS and communicating it down the supply chain. This will prevent dissemination of incorrect information in the SDS and on the label.

The WG chair of the **pilot project on Substances in Articles (SiA)** presented the main results and conclusions of the project, where 15 Member States participated, investigating in total 405 companies and 682 articles. The inspections were done during 2018 and the report was being finalised (following publication in ECHA's website in November 2019).

There was no non-compliance identified in relation to the notification obligation (REACH Article 7(2)). 12% of the articles investigated contained candidate list substances. In such cases, 88% of the companies failed to communicate the safe use information down the supply chain, breaching Article 33(1). It was found that when candidate list substances were found in concentrations above 0,1 % w/w, it was common that the companies did not fulfil the communication obligations.

An important finding of the project was that it was identified an information gap in the communication throughout the supply chains. The WG chair presented the recommendations to Industry to address this concern, which included taking a closer look at the communication duties in relation to candidate list substances, raise awareness of this issue and actively question the suppliers and chose the ones that could provide more information.

Item OS 6 - Actions taken by COM to improve the involvement of customs in REACH enforcement

The COM informed the meeting on the actions put in place to enhance the cooperation of REACH and customs inspectors, from a legal framework to joint projects and shared practices between other sectors.

Currently, COM was exploring the way to introduce the REACH requirements into the custom's procedures. Since 1 October 2019, the REACH Annex XIV substances were included in the TARIC¹⁰ database used by the customs, which allowed better identification of authorised chemicals entering the country and thus triggering further REACH controls. A similar practice will be done by the end of 2019 for restricted substances in REACH Annex XVII. The presenter added that, so far, only substances were included in the TARIC database but more work on how to tackle articles and mixtures will be developed in the future.

DG TAXUD was working on a "single window" project, that would allow any company willing to export any good to Europe, to provide one time only, in an electronic form, all the required information for customs and for other legislative obligations, (*e.g.* registration number, authorisation number) for EU cross-border circulation of the good. In case of non-compliant goods, the customs have procedures in place to deal with such situations. For the set-up of the "single window", it could be explored the use or link of information with ECHA's IT systems.

COM would continue working on improving the legislation and further integrating REACH in the customs' activities.

Item OS 7 – Conclusions and actions points from the open session

The participants agreed on the <u>action points</u> for the meeting.

The Chair thanked all participants and closed the open session.


