A. Information required from the Registrants subject to Annex IX of REACH

1. Long-term toxicity testing on fish (Annex IX, Section 9.1.6.; test method: OECD TG 210)

You must provide the information listed above for all REACH Annexes applicable to you, and in accordance with Articles 10(a) and 12(1) of REACH:

How to comply with your information requirements

To comply with your information requirements you must submit the information requested by this decision in an updated registration dossier by the deadline indicated above. You must also update the chemical safety report, where relevant, including any changes to classification and labelling, based on the newly generated information.

You must follow the general testing and reporting requirements provided under the Appendix entitled "Requirements to fulfil when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes". In addition, you should follow the general recommendations provided under the Appendix entitled "General recommendations when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes". For references used in this decision, please consult the Appendix entitled "List of references".

Appeal

This decision can be appealed to the Board of Appeal of ECHA within three months of its notification. An appeal, together with the grounds thereof, has to be submitted to ECHA in writing. Appendix A: Reasons to request information required under Annex IX of REACH

This decision is based on the examination of the testing proposal you submitted.

1. Long-term toxicity testing on fish

Long-term toxicity testing on fish is a standard information requirement in Annex IX, Section 9.1.6 to REACH.

You have submitted a testing proposal for the Substance for Fish, early-life stage toxicity test (test method: OECD TG 210).

ECHA requested your considerations for alternative methods to fulfil the information requirement for long-term toxicity on fish. You provided your considerations concluding that there were no alternative methods which could be used to adapt the information requirement(s) for which testing is proposed. ECHA has taken these considerations into account.

Your registration dossier does not include any information on long-term toxicity on fish.

Study design

ECHA considers that the proposed Fish, early-life stage toxicity test, (test method: OECD TG 210) is appropriate to fulfil the information requirement for long-term toxicity on fish.

The Substance is difficult to test due to low water solubility (0.0055 µg/L) and the adsorptive properties (Log K_{oc} between 7.4 and 11.55). OECD TG 210 specifies that for difficult to test substances, the OECD GD 23 is to be followed. To get reliable results, the substance properties need to be considered when performing the test, in particular with regard to the test design; including exposure system, test solution preparation, and sampling. OECD GD 23 (Table 1) describes testing difficulties related to a specific property of the substance. You may use the approaches described in OECD GD 23 or other approaches if more appropriate for your substance. The approach selected must be justified and documented.

Due to the substance properties it may be difficult to achieve and maintain the exposure concentrations. Therefore, you have to demonstrate that the concentration of the substance is stable throughout the test (i.e. measured concentrations remains within 80-120% of the nominal concentration). If it is not possible to demonstrate the stability, you must express the effect concentration based on measured values as described in the applicable test guideline. In case a dose-response relationship cannot be established (no observed effects), you must demonstrate that the test solution preparation method applied was sufficient to maximise the concentration of the Substance in the test solution.

Your testing proposal is accepted under Article 40(3)(a) of REACH and you are requested to conduct the test with the Substance, as specified above.

In your comments to the draft decision you consider that the period of 12 months could be insufficient for the completion of the requested test as specified in the decision. Your comments regarding the need to extend the deadline to submit the requested information are addressed in Appendix D below.

Appendix B: Requirements to fulfil when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes

A. Test methods, GLP requirements and reporting

1. Under Article 13(3) of REACH, all new data generated as a result of this decision must be conducted according to the test methods laid down in a European Commission Regulation or to international test methods recognised by the Commission or ECHA as being appropriate.
2. Under Article 13(4) of REACH, ecotoxicological and toxicological tests and analyses must be carried out according to the GLP principles (Directive 2004/10/EC) or other international standards recognised by the Commission or ECHA.
3. Under Article 10(a)(vi) and (vii) of REACH, all new data generated as a result of this decision must be reported as study summaries, or as robust study summaries, if required under Annex I of REACH. See ECHA Practical Guide on How to report robust study summaries².

B. Test material

1. Selection of the Test material(s)

The Test Material used to generate the new data must be selected taking into account the following:

- a) the boundary composition(s) of the Substance,
- b) the impact of each constituent/ impurity on the test results for the endpoint to be assessed. For example, if a constituent/ impurity of the Substance is known to have an impact on (eco)toxicity, the selected Test Material must contain that constituent/ impurity.

2. Information on the Test Material needed in the updated dossier

- a) You must report the composition of the Test Material selected for each study, under the "Test material information" section, for each respective endpoint study record in IUCLID.
- b) The reported composition must include the careful identification and description of the characteristics of the Tests Materials in accordance with OECD GLP (ENV/MC/CHEM(98)16) and EU Test Methods Regulation (EU) 440/2008 (Note, Annex), namely all the constituents must be identified as far as possible as well as their concentration. Also any constituents that have harmonised classification and labelling according to the CLP Regulation must be identified and quantified using the appropriate analytical methods,

With that detailed information, ECHA can confirm whether the Test Material is relevant for the Substance.

Appendix C: General recommendations when conducting and reporting new tests for REACH purposes

A. Environmental testing for substances containing multiple constituents

Your Substance contains multiple constituents and, as indicated in ECHA Guidance R.11 (Section R.11.4.2.2), you are advised to consider the following approaches for persistency, bioaccumulation and aquatic toxicity testing:

- the “known constituents approach” (by assessing specific constituents), or
- the “fraction/block approach, (performed on the basis of fractions/blocks of constituents), or
- the “whole substance approach”, or
- various combinations of the approaches described above

Selection of the appropriate approach must take into account the possibility to characterise the Substance (i.e. knowledge of its constituents and/or fractions and any differences in their properties) and the possibility to isolate or synthesize its relevant constituents and/or fractions.

Appendix D: Procedure

ECHA received your testing proposal(s) on 1 June 2020 and started the testing proposal evaluation in accordance with Article 40(1).

ECHA held a third party consultation for the testing proposal(s) from 7 July 2020 until 21 August 2020. ECHA did not receive information from third parties.

ECHA followed the procedure detailed in Articles 50 and 51 of REACH.

ECHA notified you of the draft decision and invited you to provide comments.

ECHA took into account your comments and did not amend the request(s), but amended the deadline.

Deadline to submit the requested information in this decision

In the draft decision communicated to you, the time indicated to provide the requested information was 12 months from the date of adoption of the decision.

In your comments on the draft decision you requested ECHA to extend the standard granted time to a total of 18 months. You base your claim on the fact that the Substance is a *'complex UVCB composed mainly of molecules that are highly hydrophobic and that have a considerable adsorption potential'*. Therefore, you expect *'lengthy preliminary step to assess the solubilisation of the test substance in the test medium as well as the stability of measured concentrations'*.

Furthermore, you considered that the extension to 18 months is needed since *'multiple laboratories are currently facing technical challenges related to the COVID-19 world crisis and often cannot guarantee that studies are completed in their usual timeframe'*. ECHA has sent you a requested for proof of low laboratory capacity through REACH-IT. In your reply you have provided further information in support of your claim.

ECHA took this information into account and granted 6 months extension to the original deadline for preliminary tests and to account for low laboratory capacity. Therefore, the deadline is set to 18 months.

ECHA notified the draft decision to the competent authorities of the Member States for proposals for amendment.

As no amendments were proposed, ECHA adopted the decision under Article 51(3) of REACH.
