Main roles of a company in REACH & CLP








- Manufacturer: manufactures a substance
- Importer: imports hazardous chemicals from outside the EU
- Downstream user: uses chemicals, such as formulating or transferring mixtures
- Distributor: stores/distributes chemicals

A company may have multiple roles



Suppliers of mixtures




Suppliers of **mixtures** play a key role in enhancing the safe use of hazardous mixtures

Distributors




Downstream users placing a

Main roles of suppliers of mixtures







CLP – key obligations for suppliers of mixtures




- You must classify, label and package mixtures in accordance with CLP before placing them on the market
- If you are formulating or changing the composition of a mixture, you must derive the classification of the mixture
- If you do NOT change the composition of a mixture, you may take over the classification for the mixture already derived by another actor in the supply chain
- If you import a hazardous mixture, you must classify the ingredient substances according to CLP and notify the C&L Inventory (if they lead to or contribute to the classification of the mixture).





Timelines for change from DPD to CLP



CLP implements the Globally Harmonised System of classification and labelling of chemicals (GHS, UN 2007) in the EU

DPD: Dangerous Preparations Directive



REACH – key obligations on information in the supply chain

REACH describes:

- when, what and how to communicate information downstream in the supply chain and on the hazards and risk reduction measures
- obligations related to safety data sheets (SDS), exposure scenarios (ES), and other forms of communications when SDS/ES are not required.
- when and what to communicate upstream

REACH sections of particular relevance to suppliers are Title IV and Annex II. This replaces SDS Directive 91/155/EEC



REACH – key obligations for downstream users



On receipt of information on substances and mixtures, downstream users are obliged to:

- identify appropriate risk reduction measures
- apply them to their own use
- recommend relevant risk reduction measures to their customers



Distributors





Distributors (including retailers) store and place chemicals on the market for third parties. REACH & CLP obligations are limited to forwarding information in the supply chain.



If they also **import** hazardous chemicals from outside the EU: **importer obligations** related to classification and notification to ECHA.





If they also **use** chemicals: **downstream user obligations** under REACH

If they change the composition: classify under CLP
